
December 2022

HEALTH BENEFITS ANNUAL REPORT

There was a temporary reduction in claims utilization during the pandemic (2021) resulting in a 3% reduction in premiums. The reduction remained in place during 2022 in spite rising utilization and costs.

Plan use levels were back to pre-pandemic levels in 2022 as were travel levels. Hence you will have noticed an increase in premiums deducted from your December 2022 pension.

NEW FOR 2023:

- Starting January 1, 2023, the RTOERO policy will require you to submit you claims within six months from the date the expense was incurred.
- Dental Plan reimbursements will be updated to the 2023 fee guide for general practitioners.
- There have been many improvements to the RTOERO travel insurance. Check out page 7 of Communique Health Benefits Update.
- CloudMD replaces Teladoc (previously Best Doctors) as the medical second-opinion service for Extended Health Care plan participants. Check out page 10 in Communique.

Meet Al Linnell, B.A., M.Ed. (Past President District 7 Executive 2005-2009



GRATEFUL...x 5!

(Educational Profession, Art-Music Mentors, Family, Health Care System, God)

Life began in a downtown central Windsor neighborhood during the War. I was raised with love by a Scottish mother and grandmother. After a serious fall left me in hospital for two months with a broken arm and pneumonia (near death), my mother used our home as collateral to have a specialist straighten my arm, saving my life. Soon after that and traumatically for me, my dog was killed. I got to meet my military father for the first time at the vulnerable age of five. We then moved to the west side of Windsor where I quickly learned to run from bullies and deal with street diversity at its worst! A cub pack gave me some refuge but, six weeks before progressing to Scout level, we moved again to central Windsor.

Life became better for me as an only child with the advent of a cousin from England. He loved to listen to Big Band Jazz. I studied piano for three years and took an active interest in drumming. I continued my adventures as a street kid and began work as a delivery boy four days a week at 35 cents an hour. I started formal drum lessons and moved up a level as a grocery store "boxing boy" at 65 cents an hour. The summer after my first year of high school, I went to Ipperwash Cadet Army Camp and marched in the band (six weeks for 85 dollars). That Fall I started playing with the Windsor Symphony Junior Orchestra under Conductor, Matti Holli and began playing professionally with local musicians in Windsor's clubs. I joined the Assumption University Dance Band and learned a lot from my professional music mentors. I also joined the Windsor Regiment Military Band and studied formal percussion in the summer with the Canadian Armed Services in Petawawa. One musical mentor got me an audition for the Elmwood Casino Band at age 16. For three years, while struggling through high school, I got to play for many Show Business greats.

In my nineteenth year, I lost my Scottish Grandmother, found a great girlfriend (later wife), and enrolled in the newly-opened Windsor Teacher's College. Graduation was forthcoming as was an Art-Music Supervisor position in Sandwich South Township for seven small schools in 1964. I loved the system-wide acceptance of my offerings and style as a beginning educator paid 2,800 dollars my first year. The students and all-female teaching staff (caring mentors) were very supportive. In my second year, the system received world-wide notoriety for a terrible bus tragedy that lost seven of our students with injury to many others. I taught all seven of those beautiful children and miss them to this very day. In 1970, I accepted a position at a new open concept school, Sandwich West Elementary. With a handpicked staff and access to school design, a substantial budget, and an outreach position with the National Design Council of Canada, we accomplished many creative programmes. From there, in 1973, I procured the position of Coordinator of Visual Arts with the County Separate School Board and opened St. Mark's School which acted for fourteen years as a creative location for school bus trips, teacher workshops, Ministry and private courses. During those years, I was also a proud Associate Professor for the University of Windsor's Faculty of Education thanks to Professor Buck's recommendation. I loved my thirteen part time years there as I got to meet, recommend, and hire many young talented Art's teachers from all over our province.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

During this time, I helped to raise two very creative children, Scott and Cori, while married to my wife, Linda, a St. Clair College Health Science Professor. This fertile stability allowed me to pursue many arts related activities in our community as producer, performer, board member, and clinician most noteworthy as:

♣ founding committee member – Windsor Corporate Challenge Cup 1979-99;

founding Curator Essex County Civic Centre Art Collection in the municipal officesrepresenting 96 local Artist constructs belonging to Essex County rate payers;

♣ founding chairman Arts Council Windsor and Region-15 years;

♣ originator educational performance shows Contemporary Arts Ensemble (10,000 students at Cleary Auditorium) and Synectikos Integrated Arts Ensemble (12,000 students at St. Clair College).

In 2001, I "semi-retired" and moved into St. Thomas of Villanova Secondary School and am still there as Theatre Manager. I enjoy instructing Hand Drumming for Health for the Uni-Com University of Windsor's Senior Community Outreach Programme and have instructed part time for Academie Ste. Cecile 2011-2019. Having received a number of personal awards throughout my active 60-year career, I would proudly like to mention being inducted into the Windsor Essex County Music Recognition Award Society in 2018.

The Pandemic dealt all of us a difficult time. In my case, the past two years have brought me face to face with some of our best health care doctors which, thankfully resulted in a successful cancer treatment. As a new octogenarian, Art's educator-practitioner, and advocate, having experienced the loss of many talented students/friends, I would like to propose a grateful toast to the pride, energy, and passion in every soul I have ever met, and give humble thanks for your existence. In the milieux of life's fragility and all the current negativity, I ask you to ask yourself... just how full is your glass?



Local boards have been contacted in hopes of further publicizing these workshops through their internal networks as these retirement workshops are open to all education workers.



POLITICAL ADVOCACY REPORT

A summary of what's happened since our last newsletter for those who are politically astute and seniors who should be... and those returning from the sunny south (as of March 20 deadline). Following are snippets of some of the political issues since January.

The Ontario Health Coalition and the Windsor Health Coalition branch have been very active encouraging everyone to write their MPPs and to attend rallies to protest the province's health care plan, privatization, wage capping etc. I took part in a W.H.C. Zoom meeting on February 9 and attended an "emergency" town hall meeting in Chatham February 15, titled "Our Hospital is not for sale". Interesting, informative and serious. A third rally was held March 9.

Opposition party members of the committee examining the Liberals' somewhat contentious **gun control legislation** unite in ensuring Canadian hunters aren't "disarmed" by the government.

NDP indicate it could pull Liberal support over privatization of health care if it doesn't pass a pharmacare bill this year.

Challenges faced **municipalities exploring how public budgets should be prepared** and sought more effective ways to improve budgetary processes, in light of higher inflation rates. A municipal budget is an immensely complex expenditure plan and ultimately very political.

Since the beginning of the year "crisis" in regard to health care has become the prevalent noun, with "unacceptable" not far behind. **Most Canadians believe when it comes to health care there is both need and appetite for change.** Premier Ford announced a series of changes to health care delivery and increased funding i.e. \$30 million for expanded local cardiac and cancer care. He also announced legislation to accept out-of-province credentials and expand the nursing program by offering \$25,000 bonuses to nurses working in the US and to health care workers working in other provinces. Alberta Premier Smith looked at creating health spending accounts as an "add on" to inject more money into the health system. Quebec Premier Legault promised to increase the number of private clinics and build "mini" private hospitals built by the private sector but with services paid for by the province.

Locally, the new NDP provincial leader, Marit Stiles, along with Windsor West MPP Lisa Gretzky were critical of the province's health care plan, saying innovation, not privatization is needed for the recovery of "a system in crisis". The non-profit business puts service and community-based missions first, rather than profit.

The Ford government is appealing the Ontario Superior Court ruling that the attempt to cap wage increases for public sector employees at 1% for three years was unconstitutional because it infringed on Charter rights that guarantee freedom of association and collective bargaining.

Nursing Home Staffing Crisis By March 31, 2025, the Ontario Government wants every nursing home resident to receive four hours of daily hands-on care. The Premier said \$ 4.9 billion will be spent to hire staff. But several not-for-profit homes are unlikely to meet that goal because workers are leaving for higher paying temp agencies, which then charge exorbitant fees to replace the very staff they poached. An example: on average, registered nurses working for homes made \$43 an hour while fees for agency RNs were \$88 an hour.

Ontario has released a new "connected" and "convenient" health-care plan aimed at shortening wait times and localizing access to care across the province. Ontario Health Minister Sylvia Jones announced details about the plan, "Your Health -A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care," during a press conference on February 2 in Toronto. The announcement comes as Ontario battles a crisis that has touched nearly every aspect of the health care system, from staffing shortages to substantial surgical wait lists. "When it comes to your health and the health of all Ontarians, the status quo isn't working," Jones said at the Thursday announcement.



Political Advocacy, continued

The government also released a 50-page report, outlining three broad pillars as a framework for the province's health-care plan moving forward: The Right Care in the Right Place, Faster Access to Care and Hiring More Health Care Workers. "Some of these changes will happen immediately as we take action to address pressing issues. Other changes will take time. They will be phased in over the months and years ahead," Jones said. This plan comes on the heels of the government's new three-step approach to expand for-profit surgical and diagnostic centres.

Ontario doctors have said investing in private health-care will only exacerbate staffing shortages and wait times for urgent care. Ontario NDP health critic and MPP, France Gelinas, said Thursday that residents should not be "fooled" by the Ford government's new plan, claiming it is poised to privatize the health-care sector.

After agreeing to the federal government's 10 year deal to inject \$46.2 billion into provincial health spending, premiers have moved on to negotiating bilateral deals to improve family health services, worker backlogs, mental health and addiction services etc. Some premiers still say they're concerned the Trudeau government's best offer isn't a long term solution.
