Political Advocacy Report

As PAC Chair, it is important that I keep abreast of political and health issues, particularly health as it affects seniors. Bill 60 ("Your Health Act"), the hospital privatization legislature that will cut core hospital services and privatize them to for-profit clinics, and the backlash, especially from the Ontario Health Coalition, certainly dominated my spring reading. We all await the outcome of the Bill and the "referendum" from the OHC.

I receive calls and emails about senior issues and concerns – e.g. why is RTOERO non-partisan? (a provincial issue). Several involved the progress and plans for the new Windsor/Essex Acute Care Hospital project. (Yes, your Executive endorsed the site chosen). What follows is a brief update and summary of the project.

The project has achieved a major planning milestone with the submission of its Stage 1.3 (formerly Stage 2) plan to the Minister of Health. The submission is the result of extensive collaboration with many partners within the hospital, the community and the province. It includes a functional program, a set of block diagrams, a campus plan and an updated cost estimate. Hospital planners, in consultation with 40 User Groups representing all hospital programs and services, developed the submission over 18 months.

The Ministry of Health Capital Branch will now review the submission, provide feedback and work with the hospital to ensure the final approved plan aligns with provincial expectations and standards for modern and efficient hospital care. The Project Management Team looks forward to working with the Ministry of Health, responding quickly (their words) to any questions and addressing any challenges to proceed to the next stage of planning.

One key area of focus now is the development of a Stage 1.3 submission for the Ouellette Campus, where Urgent Care and other Ambulatory Services will be offered after the new hospital opens. A firm has been recruited to "repurpose and maximize the use of of the Ouellette Campus" going forward.

We look forward to being kept informed of the Project's Vision: "Create a state-of-the art treatment and healing environment for all of those who we care for; a supportive workplace with the latest technologies to allow all of our staff to provide the the most efficient and highest quality care, in a new hospital that supports well-being and has the capacity to provide timely patient and family-centred care for generations to come."

District 7's Eldest Member Bernadette Chaput

Bernadette began her teaching career on a two-room school in Tilbury. She began life in Tilbury West Township, January 5th, 1916. At 107 years young, she is the eldest member of District 7 and the oldest female receiving U.S. Social Security living in Canada.

When she married, she and her husband Leo moved to (appropriately) Academy Dr., in Windsor. She became a teacher with the Essex County Catholic School Board and later with the Windsor-Essex School Board and taught French at various schools in the city.

She was very comfortable in the teaching profession and that ease led to helping others in her profession with guidance and support, an aspect of her career for which she is particularly fond.

Bernadette and Leo attended many social gatherings in South Windsor and rubbed elbows with many prominent people. She was gifted with a beautiful smile and was so charming with whomever she met. To this day, many of her former students recognize her and come up to her while we take her out for a coffee and with some of them she actually remembers their names.

Bernadette wasn't a world traveller but she and her husband spent a lot of vacation time in northern Ontario and Quebec. The family reunions at the farm on the Comber side road still hold a lot of precious memories of simpler times and family ties.

Bernadette and Leo wintered in Florida after retiring and she became a very good shuffleboard player having won many trophies.

One of her other passions was for sewing. She assembled quite a library of patterns and made quite a bit of her own clothing.

Bernadette also had a very good eye for art. Some of the pictures that she painted began with simple paint by numbers then developed into free hand. She painted small murals in the basement of her home.





We can also attest to the fact that the reason why she is still mobile at her age is because she enrolled herself in the senior aqua fitness at St.Clair College and drove herself there for approximately 15 years, well into her 80's.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT Meet Bill Van Wyck A Life Well Lived 1931-2023

Writing about the life, career and accomplishments of Mr. William Van Wyck was supposed to be easy. I would go to his retirement home in March 2023, sit with him for an hour, and get some facts from his incredible life.

Only he didn't want to brag or boast. He didn't want to explain anything in detail, in fact he left out many details about his life as a teacher, a traveller and a mentor. No, Mr. Van Wyck was in fact a list maker. A succinct and concise man who could get to the point of any discussion. He wakes up every morning and writes a gratitude list. He has already written his obituary. He checks the stock market reports, analyzing his investments and watches his money carefully. I arrived for this interview with a list of questions, however, Mr. Van Wyck had other plans.

What does the list look like in the First Act?

Born on March 9, 1931 and raised in Windsor at 153 Crawford Rd., the current site of Devonshire Retirement home. Went to Cameron Ave Public School. He has fond memories of his kindergarten teacher Miss Webster and his Grade 3 teacher Miss Francis. Went to Patterson Collegiate and has fond memories of his gym teacher Mr. Dawson and the Vice Principal Mr. Hayden. Went to Queens University and studied Psychology and Biology. Followed that up with a teaching degree from the Ontario College of Education, where he found himself having to live in a funeral home doing odd jobs to earn spending money. He would return in the summer to work at Hiram Walker and Purity Dairy. Went on to get a master's degree in theology from the Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. Then returned to Windsor to teach at Patterson Collegiate and Kennedy Collegiate.

Let's explore the list in the Second Act.

According to Mr. Van Wyck his goal when teaching English was to focuson reading, writing, speaking fluently and being articulate. His favourite author is Joseph Conrad, favourite book is Heart of Darkness. His favourite play to teach was Othello. His favourite book to teach was Catcher in the Rye (I mistakenly thought he would choose Waiting for Godot). His favourite movie of all time is Casablanca. His favourite actress was Elizabeth Taylor. He highly respected Annie Sullivan as a great teacher. He respected Franklin Roosevelt as a great risk taker.

How does the Third Act look?

Mr. Van Wyck retired in 1993. Served on the Boards of the Alzheimer's Society, the Ontario Employment Insurance Service, various volunteer programs, Little Tomato Theatre Company and very active within the municipal, provincial and federal Liberal party. He was the Returning Officer for Windsor West in 3 elections. Attended 6 Liberal Party conventions throughout Canada. When I asked how he explained his longevity, his list included: one day a week he fasts, he keeps his mind sharp by watching Front Line, CNN, PBS and TVO, he exercises, he believes in getting substantial sleep to regenerate the brain, he reads the bible andlistens to opera. I explain to Mr. Van Wyck that I was very happy to receive all this information, but I REALLY wanted to know about was what had made him famous in Windsor, what got him often in the Windsor Star and what he was often interviewed about on the local news... his many visits to the Summer Olympics, the students he brought there and how he paid ALL THE EXPENSES of the students to these incredible locations.

What, there is a list in the Fourth Act too?

Montreal 1976, Los Angeles 1984, Barcelona 1992, Atlanta 1996, Athens 2004 (where he brought the students on an extended 3-week trip to see Greece, the birthplace of the Olympics), Beijing 2008, London 2012, Rio de Janeiro 2016. He was planning to go to Tokyo in 2020 with a group until a health scare in 2019 made him slow down and cancel. He was itching to go to Paris in 2024. He really hopes he can make it.


We have now passed hour 2 of this interview and are headed deep into the third hour. Now the stories are flowing.

Mr. Van Wyck pulls out a white plastic grocery bag filled with photos of his trips, photo albums, newspaper clippings, travel guides, post cards and a few small souvenirs. I can see that the photo albums have been made by some of the students he took on his trips (best estimates are approximately 90 students received this trip of a lifetime). Their handwritten notes in the front cover tell him that they will never forget him, that they appreciated being chosen to go and how lucky they were to have experienced what they did. They write of their gratitude that he always took time to talk to them and to listen to them. He gave them so much independence during their time away and they appreciated the trust he had in them to make good choices. Mr. Van Wyck shares his most favourite memory of the Beijing trip by showing me a photo of three girls... Heather, Lexi and Holly. They are on the Great Wall of China. The timing was perfect. The photographer (another student) has captured them high in the air, with arms over their heads, legs bent back, bare feet, big smiles and eyes wide open. Mr. Van Wyck calls this photo "JOY" and I read on the back where Heather writes a beautiful message, "I can't describe how it felt to take my first step on the wall. The surrounding mountains were rugged, bright green with jagged peaks. This wall is beautiful and formidable. Holly, Lexi and I took off our sandals and ran along the wall up and down steps, through watchtowers. We won't soon forget the feel of the dusty stone beneath our feet." I am truly in awe of this photo. I tell Mr. Van Wyck that he has achieved what every teacher hopes to achieve sometime in their career... real impact! Leaving students with a life long impactful moment.

Mr. Van Wyck shares his list of impactful moments in his life: visiting the Anne Frank house as a young man in 1972, seeing the Winged Victory of Samothrace at the Louvre in Paris, seeing the Lincoln Memorial, touching a letter written by Thomas Jefferson, walking along the Gandhi Ghat on the Ganges River, meeting Indira Gandhi in India, walking at the Parthenon and seeing the Taj Mahal.

Epilogue

Throughout this interview and really every time I saw Mr. Van Wyck at RTO events, I could never call him "Bill" as others do, because he had been my teacher at Kennedy (1978-82) after all. He was the reason why I loved Shakespeare and The Glass Menagerie. And now we have reached the Final Act. Mr. Van Wyck would have hated that I started a sentence with "and." On May 6th, Mr. Van Wyck passed away. His obituary was ready. There was no mention of any of the Olympics. He was too humble to brag about his generosity. On May 27th, friends and family, former colleagues and students gathered for his Celebration of Life. Memory tables of various artifacts and souvenirs were set up. Photo display boards were around the room. Front and centre there was "JOY" sitting on a tall easel, blown up to 20 by 24 size. His nephew explained that there were instructions to display an enlarged print of this special photo. Those who knew Mr. Van Wyck well spoke of his humour, his dedication to teaching, his favourite Bible passage – ACTS 20:35, and his love of the hymn Amazing Grace. Heather (all grown up now) was there too and told funny, sentimental stories about her teacher/mentor/friend. See you in Paris in 2024 Mr. Van Wyck.





RTOERO MEMBERSHIP

We have had number of phone calls from people with respect to the status of their membership in RTOERO. Some thinking they are members, only to find out that in fact, they are not. Others thinking that they are enrolled in our Health Plan, only to find out, that they are members of another Health Plan with a similar name. In order to eliminate this confusion, the RTOERO Health Plan is now called ENTENTE Group Insurance Program

Membership in RTOERO is open to all employees in the education community. This includes all school board employees, university and college employees and early childhood educators (ECE's).

However, membership is not automatic. You actually have to apply.

Once retired, you are eligible for Full Membership with access to all benefits provided through RTOERO. Currently the Membership Fee is \$73.00 paid annually and subject to an annual increase in keeping with the rate of inflation.

<u>Prior</u> to retirement, you are eligible for Active Employee Membership. This gives you access to most benefits provided through RTOERO with the exception of serving at the Provincial level and enrolment in the ENTENTE Group Insurance Program.

However, if as an Active Member, you are 50+ years of age and no longer have health benefits through your employer, you are eligible for enrolment in the ENTENTE Group Insurance Program. Health Coverage is not free. Information and premium rates are available through the Toronto office.

As an Active Member, upon retirement, you need to contact the Office in Toronto and confirm with them as to whether or not you wish to change over to a Full Member and whether or not you wish to enroll in the ENTENTE Group Insurance Program.

It is important to note that in order to belong to the ENTENTE Group Insurance Program YOU MUST BE AN RTOERO MEMBER. However, you can belong to RTOERO without taking advantage of the RTOERO Health Plan.

The RTOERO staff continue to serve members via a hybrid model combining work in the office and work from home on a regularly set schedule.

Enhancements to the Travel Plan

- > Dental accident \$5,000 for emergency treatment
- Dental pain \$600 for emergency treatment
- Emergency Evacuation \$5,000 from a remote location (e.g., mountain, sea)
- Return of Luggage \$500 when insured is returned by emergency air transportation or return of deceased

Enhancements to Trip Cancellation/Trip Interruption (TC/TI)

- Document replacement when travelling \$500 combined (e.g., passport, driver's license)
- Pet Return \$500 if eligible trip interruption/delay
- Natural disaster TC/TI has been added at destination
- Service/therapy dog TC/TI has been added for illness or death if dog was to accompany you on trip
- Toiletries/clothing \$400/person reimbursement when baggage is delayed more than 12 hours.

Proof of Travel Dates

When you're travelling, you DO NOT need to tell us in

advance about your departure date and return date for each trip.

However, in the event of a claim, you will be required to provide proof of your date of departure and the date of return.

The proof must take place in your province of residence. Some examples of acceptable proof are:


- airline ticket
- boarding pass
- > passport stamp
- transaction receipts such as gas, hotel or a store purchase

Importance of Travel Insurance while Travelling within Canada

- Trip cancellation & interruption/delay
- > Ground ambulance costs vary by province (can be over \$700)
- > Air ambulance also varies by province (approximately \$6,000 \$12,000)
- > Vehicle return
- > Repatriation

Be sure to check out your plan booklet for complete coverage info. You may want to toss the booklet in your suitcase when travelling.





DID YOU KNOW? "A FOOD BANK -----IN KINGSVILLE?"

It's amazing the number of times we have heard those words. Yes, the need is there now and was also there in 1996. A group of concerned citizens became aware of the growing need to provide a location in Kingsville where residents in need of assistance, could get that help in their own community. At that time, the Salvation Army Food Bank in Learnington was their only option. This often presented a problem since transportation was not always available.

On September 3rd, 1996 a group of dedicated volunteers, under the leadership of Dorothy Martin, opened the doors to the Kingsville Community Food Bank. The location was on Main Street East in the building occupied by the South Essex Community Centre. It didn't take long for the word to spread that the Food Bank needed help. Donations of both food items and money began to pour in from service clubs, schools, churches, sporting groups, businesses, and individuals. The amount of food donated finally became more than the SECC office could accommodate, and a move to a more spacious location was necessary. Saturday, March 23rd, 2002, was to be moving day. A call went out for volunteer help from the community. In true Kingsville fashion, the residents pulled together making it possible for the Food Bank to reopen at its new location four days later. It was still on Main Street East just to the west and across the street (the site of the present-day Driving School).

Change affects several things. In late 2009, the intersection at Main Street and Division Street was reconfigured to accommodate a better traffic flow. This eliminated the three parking spaces in front of the Food Bank, and NO STOPPING signs were put up. When clients stopped in the area to pick up their food order, they were issued fines. Now I ask you, if you can't afford to buy food, how are you supposed to pay for a ticket? TIME FOR ANOTHER MOVE!

The search was on for a new location that was still in the downtown area and able to provide a large enough to accommodation. It was finally decided a section of the building at 18 Division Street North would be suitable. Once again, the call went out for help, and again Kingsville residents answered the call. This time we acquired the help of all the grade 8 students from Kingsville Public School, who shuttled the numerous food items to the new location. Interestingly, two of these students had recently attended a poverty workshop as part of a Social Justice team. In conjunction with this the classes had completed a geography unit on local and global poverty. What a great bunch of kids!

Speaking of kids, as teachers we may wonder if there are a few "bad apples", but on the whole, kids are amazing. Whether it's donating their birthday money, asking for food items instead of gifts, raising money selling lemonade, or organizing a can drive in their neighbourhood, kids come through. It is always heartwarming to see the pride in their eyes and in those of their parents, when they make their presentation to the Food Bank. It is often a 2-handkerchief day for the volunteers.

On a number occasions our Food Bank, which is a totally independent organization, has been able to reach out to other food banks when they have needed a helping hand. We have supported the Wheatley food bank after their town's devastating explosion, the student food bank at Canterbury College at the University of Windsor, and the Harrow Pantry, to name a few. Due to the continued support we receive from our community, we feel grateful that we can help other groups.

"A FOOD BANK ----- IN KINGSVILLE?"

And now to the volunteers. Food banks are only successful when there are dedicated volunteers to keep them going. Over the years, Kingsville Community Food Bank has had them by the dozens. *Not surprising, retired teachers, both past and present, make up a goodly number of those wishing to lend a helping hand. A few names you may recognize are Sandra Wrench, Annetta Dunnion, Patty Kratz, Linda Pearson, Marie Bailey and yours truly. I witness the dedication and compassion of the volunteers each week as they go about the various tasks required to keep the Food Bank functioning smoothly.*

In the beginning it was estimated that approximately 70 Kingsville families relied on the Leamington food bank for assistance. Today, the Kingsville Community Food Bank serves nearly 3 times that number. Not wishing to bore you with numbers, suffice it to say that in the first 5 months of 2023, the number of <u>individuals</u> served is about 1100 more than in 2022 for the same 5 months.

The need is definitely there. Fortunately, the residents of Kingsville and surrounding areas support our Food Bank, allowing us to provide a very necessary service.

I wish to thank RTO for giving us the opportunity to tell the story of the Kingsville Community Food Bank, and for the support received from the members of this fine organization.


